

From The Vicar's Desk

Waiting for the light...



As I write this article at the end of October the clocks have just changed. This time of year can feel full of busyness, jobs to do, but it can also feel darker with more possibility for isolation as we spend more time inside, without the usual incidental opportunities to see each other. By the time you read this article it will be the Advent season when we are waiting for the light of Christ to come into the world, a welcome light as the love of God comes close. through the birth of Jesus, the stable and the light of truth and revelation that will be fully revealed at the end of time that Christians also look to, but perhaps speak less about. We are not simply waiting for Christ the Baby but waiting for Christ the Kina, not only the stable but the throne.

As we think about the end times it has sent Christians at different times to ponder signs of the times or consider the darkness. If you have ever experienced darkness, or a power cut, focusing on the light is necessary, helpful and hopeful. If we have a power cut during the dark hours it is difficult, and as the dawn approaches it overwhelms with

the light we come to depend on. In the same way I would suggest that focusing on the light is more helpful, holy and wholesome than focusing on the darkness.

To focus on the light is to focus on that which is good in the world, in others and in ourselves and ultimately in God who is the source of all goodness. We go through darkness in our lives, times when we cannot see the light and need to depend and trust on the coming of the dawn. We can become tired and weary from all that life throws at us in so many ways. through circumstance, health, relationships and even a sense that God is distant from us. And vet. let us not auit, but rest. Rest in the quiet and the darkness knowing that the light is coming and that the dawn is on its way. Knowing too that the darkness also offers us peace and quiet and the possibility of new things, just as plants need darkness to grow.

Advent offers us a chance to wait on the love of God and continue our journey to him and to his light. When we see a light in the darkness the darkness cannot overwhelm

it, our eyes are drawn to it, the darkness is transformed by it. We can rest in the darkness knowing that the dawn is coming.

'In the tender compassion of our God

The dawn from on high shall break upon us

To shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death,

And to guide our feet into the way of peace.' (Luke 1:78-9)

So during Advent let us wait faithfully, patiently and steadfastly in the darkness for the light...

'The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world' (John 1:5, 9)

Confirmation Candidates

'God has called you by name and made you his own.'

In the Church of England, the Bishop says these words to everyone being confirmed. God is calling you and making you his own. Confirmation is a moving sacramental experience for both the Bishop and those being confirmed.

Confirmation is a special way of receiving God's grace: the presence of God's gift of the Holy Spirit is confirmed in you through prayer and the laying on of the Bishop's hands for the life of Christian faithfulness, service and witness.

It is a step of personal faith: you confirm that you take on for yourself that which was taken on for you at your baptism as a child, confirming your faith and your membership of the body of Christ. It is admission to Holy Communion as you confirm your full membership of the community of faith as it is expressed in the Eucharist.

Lastly, it is a rite of passage: an act symbolising the movement from childhood to adulthood in which the church community confirms your intention to assume the privileges and responsibilities of being an adult member of the community.

St Michael's will be holding the **Deanery Confirmation on Sunday 7th December 2025 at 5pm** when Bishop Tim, the Bishop of
Wolverhampton will confirm candidates from our own church plus candidates from other churches around the deanery and diocese.
Please pray for the candidates and try to support them by your attendance at this special service.

Our Top 10 Ideas For An Eco Friendly Christmas








1) Decorations, DIY and repurposed items:

Make decorations from natural materials like pine cones, twigs or dried oranges. Reuse old baubles and tinsel by turning them into a new wreath or garland.

- **2) Eco-friendly alternatives:** Avoid tinsel and buy plastic-free crackers, or make your own from toilet roll tubes.
- 3) Sustainable lighting: Turn off lights when you're out and consider using solar-powered lights for outdoor decorations to reduce light pollution.
- 4) Eco-friendly Gifts and wrapping:
 Use fabric, reusable gift bags, or brown
 paper with string. Old newspapers and
 magazines can also be used for a
 unique look.
- **5) Handmade cards:** Make your own cards from recycled paper or seed paper to reduce waste.
- **6) Reduce food waste:** Plan meals realistically to avoid overbuying, especially fresh food. Use leftovers or share them with neighbours.

Christmas Recipes

If you prefer a less rich pudding at Christmas and are looking for a good alternative try the recipe below.

It is a lot quicker to prepare and there is no soaking of fruit or resting before steaming.

As the name suggests, 'St Stephen's Pudding' is eaten on the 'Feast of Stephen', (Boxing Day), so maybe make 2, one for Christmas Day and one for Boxing Day.

It can be made a couple of days before and placed in the fridge until it is needed. This recipe serves 4 and needs to be steamed for 2 hours.

St Stephen's Pudding

Ingredients:

- 4 oz (110g) white breadcrumbs
- 3 tbs milk
- 2 oz (50g) self raising flour, sifted
- 2 oz (50g) light brown soft sugar
- 3 oz (75g) shredded suet
- A pinch of salt
- 4oz (110g) seedless raisins
- 2 medium cooking apples, peeled and grated
- Grated zest of 1 lemon
- 1 large egg

You will also need a 2 pint (1.2 litre) pudding basin, well-buttered, some baking parchment, kitchen foil, and some string.

Method:

- In a large mixing bowl, combine all the dry ingredients; add raisins, grated apples and lemon zest
- Stir thoroughly to combine everything well. Beat the egg into the milk and stir into the mixture. Pack the mixture into the pudding basin, cover the basin tightly with a sheet of baking parchment, then with a sheet of foil make a pleat in the centre and secure with string.
- 3. Boil a kettle and pour the boiling water into a saucepan, about half full, place it on a medium heat and, when it comes back to the boil, fit a steamer over the top. Steam the pudding for 2 hours, checking the water level in the saucepan now and then.
- 4. Serve with custard, or at to make it a little more special at Christmas with rum sauce.



Ingredients:

- 4-5 tbs dark rum
- 3 oz (75a) butter
- \$ 2½ oz (60g) plain flour
- 1 pint (570ml) milk
- 2 oz (50g) caster sugar
- 1 tbs double cream

Method:

- Place 2½ oz of the butter in a saucepan with the flour pour in the milk, using a balloon whisk, whisk vigorously over a medium heat.
- As soon as it comes to simmering point and has thickened, turn the heat right down to its lowest setting and stir in the sugar and let the sauce cook for 10 minutes. After that add the rum the remaining butter and cream and stir well.
- Pour into a jug, and cover the surface with clingfilm and keep warm until required. Whisk before serving.





CHRISTIAN SAINTS, SAINT STEPHEN The Know Your Church



What do you associate with the 26th December? Traditionally it is known as Boxing Day.

There are two theories why it is called Boxing Day, both linked to giving. The first was a medieval tradition of opening church alms boxes to give money and goods to the poor on the day after Christmas. The other is that wealthy employers gave their servants a day off and a *Christmas Box* with gifts and leftovers. Today the bank holiday is associated with Sports, January Sales and spending time with family.

The 26th December is also the Feast day of St Stephen, mentioned in the well-known Carol **Good King Wenceslas looked out on the feast of Stephen.** So who was St Stephen?

Stephen was the first Christian martyr, a Hellenized (a Greek influenced, Greek-speaking) Jew chosen as one of the first deacons in Jerusalem to serve the poor. Accused of blasphemy for his powerful defence of Jesus as the Messiah, he was stoned to death, and is remembered

for his unyielding faith, asking God to forgive his executioners.

St Stephen, His Life and Ministry

Stephen is first mentioned in Acts of the Apostles as one of seven deacons appointed by them to distribute food and charitable aid to poorer members of the community. The reason for the appointment of the deacons was dissatisfaction among Hellenistic Jews who felt that their widows were being ignored in preference to widows of Hebraic (of Hebrew origin) Jews in distribution of alms from the community funds.

'Stephen was full of faith and the Holy Spirit and is said to have performed miracles among the people.'

He was a powerful Preacher, preaching fluent and persuasive sermons among synagogues of Hellenistic Jews. This aroused opposition from some Hellenistic Jewish groups who challenged Stephen's teachings, but Stephen defeated their argument in debate.

Angry at this humiliation they secretly bribed witnesses to testify that Stephen had preached blasphemy against Moses and God. He was forced to appear before the Sanhedrin (a Jewish legislative assembly of elders) accusing him of preaching against the Temple and the Mosaic Law. Stephen is said to have been unperturbed, his face looking like **that of an angel.**

In a long speech to the Sanhedrin he fiercely denounced the Jewish authorities who were sitting in judgement on him. He presented his view of the history of Israel.

He began by recounting the history of the Israelites from Abraham through to Moses and the Exodus, highlighting God's

faithfulness and presence even when they were in Egypt.

He emphasised a recurring theme of rebellion and rejection with Israel's history, including rejecting Moses, worshipping idols, and killing the prophets.

He accused the current generation of the Sanhedrin of repeating this pattern by rejecting and killing Jesus, the *Righteous One* whom the prophets had foretold.

He addressed the charge that he was speaking against the Temple by pointing out that God is not contained in a human-made building, and implying the Temple was being treated as an idol.

He denounced his listeners as **stiff-necked** people who resist the Holy Spirit as their ancestors had done. Stating **"Was there ever a prophet your ancestors did not persecute? They even killed those who predicted the coming of the Righteous One. And now you have betrayed and murdered him."**

St Stephen's Martyrdom

Vision of Jesus: During his trial before the Sanhedrin, Stephen saw a vision of Jesus standing at the right hand of God and shared this with the crowd, a vision considered a great offense.

Execution by Stoning: Outraged, the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Witnessed by Saul: Saul of Tarsus who later became the Apostle Paul, consented to Stephen's death and held the cloaks of those who stoned him.

St Stephen's Legacy

The First Martyr: Stephen is recognised as the '*Promartyr'* of Christianity meaning the first to die for his faith after Christ.

Forgiveness in Death: He demonstrated immense compassion and forgiveness in his final moments, praying "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit" and "Lord do not charge them with this sin."

Pelsall Ladies Choir Supports 150 Local Children In Foster Care





Since September 2024,
Pelsall Ladies Choir has been
fundraising for Comfort Cases
UK, a charity which supports
children in care by providing
them with backpacks filled
with essential and comforting
items including pyjamas, blanket,
teddy, book and toiletries.

All too often, children are removed from their original home with little or none of their own possessions – which makes a difficult and heart-wrenching situation even worse and results in them feeling they have been forgotten and do not matter.

The choir's initial target was **50 backpacks**, for which around **£2,000** would need to be raised, but it soon became clear that due to the generosity of the community, including the

congregation at St Michael's, this would be surpassed. Donations, not just of cash, but of items, started flooding in, as word spread locally and people began using the Amazon wish-list which directed people to the items most needed.

In the meantime, the choir promoted the project by arranging podcasts and covering a special song which was used as the backing to the choir's project video.

On 10th July, ladies from the choir were joined by local councillors, staff from Children's Services, the Mayor and local MP Wendy Morton, to pack the 150 backpacks, which have now been gifted to local children of all ages, from babies to 18-year-olds who are about to leave the care system. The choir gives their heartfelt thanks to all those who have supported this fantastic cause.

'Our chosen charity for 2025/26 is FastAid an Emergency Community First Responder Scheme who volunteer to work with West Midlands Ambulance Service to respond to 999 calls in the local community for life threatening situations. They also offer community training to groups in CPR and Defibrillator use. Teams are completely self-funded raising funds to pay for their uniform, equipment and vehicles relying heavily upon donations from the public. Pelsall Ladies Choir have many concerts booked during the year with any monies raised being donated to this much needed charity.'

A Tribute to Tim Briggs



'Bless the Lord, O my soul, O my soul, worship His holy Name'

On 25th September 2025 our beloved friend Tim and member of St. Michael's Church passed away at the age of 69. He had faithfully worshipped and served under the leadership of many incumbents. And yet it fell upon me to have the privilege to take the funeral service of this dear Christian soul and to now write a tribute.


Tim was born on 12th March 1956 in Yorkshire, God's own country. He was a remarkable man, a humble Christian servant, devoted to his family, loyal to his friends, faithful to God, and available to anyone who needed help. In the Christian tradition, Tim wove his own tapestry of Christian life into a unique masterpiece with threads of life.

Frstly, Tim was a family man who knew how to really love his family. He was nothing less than a devoted husband to Sue. He raised Matthew and Hannah who were committed to him as he was to them. He was a good father and hard worker as a pharmacist. His grandchildren Emma, Aaron, Issac and Toby

loved him, loved being with him, and knew he loved them. He modelled what it means to love and care for a family and Tim told his family that he loved them...his life was woven with the thread of love.

Secondly, Tim was a good Samaritan who journeyed with people in joy and sorrow. He was a listening ear to those who faced trials in life. Tim was a trusted friend in a no fuss, common sense way. He had a dry Yorkshire wit and sense of humour whether it was singing with the Shelfield Male Voice Choir, performing his Yorkshire monologues at MU or chairing a PCC. Tim's servanthood in church was immense, using his gifts and talents for the Kingdom of God. Quietly he performed his role showing reliability and steadfastness. He belonged to Open the Book, Singing Group and Gift Aid co-ordinator plus more ...a life woven with threads of discipleship, friendship, and service.

Thirdly, Tim lived to leave a legacy behind him. A Christian gentle spirit, a calm quiet




person whose life reflected Christian values. Brought up in a vicarage with brother Jonathan, sister Elizabeth and parents Audrev and Derek with Dad as Vicar. He was lovingly nurtured into the Christian faith to be a disciple who followed Jesus as best he knew how. He was loval, faithful, and committed to living out his Christian life, devoted to worship, Bible reading and committing everything to prayer. And he did...he prayed to have strength to fulfil his wish to make the most of every minute count left on earth with his family. When he passed, there was simply not one thing left undone. Conversations and letters written as expressions of love and thanksgivings with family and friends. Tim's last wish was to die peacefully at home with his family.... a life woven with threads of loyalty, faithfulness and prayer with a legacy for others to follow.

Even after his death we can learn from Tim's hope, trust and confidence in God which inspired and strengthened him. He was not frightened, but brave, courageous in the face of death. He was more concerned about his family than what he was about to face. Tim wanted to be clear about the hope for salvation that he had in Jesus Christ, and

that Jesus Christ is the hope that we all have for salvation. He was resigned to what lay before him with peace and grace within him. Tim's hope in Jesus, our hope in Jesus, and Tim's presence with Jesus, makes it so much easier to bear his death. As St. Paul says, "We grieve, but not as those without hope" a life woven with threads of trust, confidence and hope in Jesus Christ and God the Father.

Finally, Tim's tapestry was a masterpiece of how lifes experiences and choices are woven together with God. Life with its unpredictable twists and turns woven with threads of joy, challenges and personal growth. This was a child of God called Tim, serving others, loving family, loving Jesus and living a good life in preparation for death. He navigated through the highs and lows, savouring the moments that made his heart dance and confronting the trials that shaped his resilience to the very end.

So let us thank Tim for simply being unique, precious and cherished. A life interwoven amongst us, for threads that have held us together, for threads that hold us close to him in his passing, for the threads which leave a legacy for us all to follow.
